Romans 12	
	How our lives should reflect God's love and mercy to us.

	The city of Corinth was a flourishing centre of trade and was renowned for its sexual immorality. Many people from Corinth became believers while Paul stayed there for 18 months. Paul reminds them what is important.
1.	What was Paul's main message?
2.	Paul contrasts the wisdom of the world with God's wisdom. What does he say that the rulers would not have done, had they known more about God?
3.	Paul says that the natural man cannot receive spiritual things. What does such a man think of spiritual matters?

	Problems in the Corinthian church.
1.	How does Paul know the Corinthians are "still fleshly"?
2.	What foundation has Paul laid on which others build?
3.	What does God think about the wisdom of this world?

1.	What did Paul want the Corinthians to know about the relationship between God, Christ, men and women?
2.	What did Jesus say the bread and cup of wine represent?
