Summary Points

- **v 1 to 7** All of Joseph's contemporaries die and Jacob's family dramatically increases in numbers
- **v 8 to 14** A new king becomes concerned about the numbers of Israelites. He makes them slaves and they build the cities of Pithom and Rameses (see map)
- v 15 to 22 The Hebrew midwives ignore Pharoah's order (see theme) to kill all baby boys. As a result God blesses the midwives by giving them families. Pharaoh then orders all his people to throw the Hebrew baby boys into the river

Making a stand

A selection of verses showing that sometimes it is necessary to make a stand where God's principles are threatened.

The midwives in Egypt made a stand against the king of Egypt who told them to kill the baby boys:

Exodus 1 verse 17

Daniel's three friends Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego refused to worship the image that king Nebuchadnezzar had set up despite severe consequences:

Daniel 3 verses 16 to 18

Peter and John made a stand against the Jewish authorities who told them to stop preaching:

Acts 4 verses 18 to 20

The apostle Paul tells the Romans to resist being conformed to this world:

Romans 12 verse 2


The apostle James echoes the same sentiment:


James 1 verse 27, 4 verse 4
