Summary Points

- v 1 The focus of Mark's message is that Jesus is the Christ and Son of God (see theme)
- v 2 and 3 The Old Testament (Malachi 3 v 1 and Isaiah 40 v 3) foretold the coming of Johnwho would prepare the way for Jesus
- v 4 to 8 John, as the forerunner of Jesus, comes baptising (see theme) in the river Jordan
- v 9 to 15 After Jesus is baptised by John, he receives the Spirit. He is then tempted by Satan. Jesus starts his mission to preach the Good News of God's Kingdom
- v 16 to 20 Jesus chooses Peter, Andrew, James and John to be his disciples
- v 21 to 45 Jesus preaches in the synagogues throughout Galilee (see map). He shows he isno ordinary person by healing those who are ill and by casting out demons

Themes

Titles of Jesus - Son of God

A selection of verses showing that Jesus is called the Son of God.

God tells David, the second king of Israel, that he will have a special descendant who willalso be Son of God:

1 Chronicles 17 verses 11 to 13

This promise is confirmed by the angel Gabriel who tells Mary that she will give birth toDavid's special descendant:

Luke 1 verses 30 to 32

In response to her question Gabriel explains to Mary that the conception of her child will be through the power of God and consequently he will be the Son of God:

Luke 1 verse 35

Baptism - a first century practice

Strong's Concordance tells us that to baptise comes from a word meaning to make fullywet. The word is used concerning ships sinking and with reference to a piece of cloth being dyed.

Baptisms recorded in the Bible imply that it is a full immersion.

John the Baptiser chooses a place to baptise where there was much water:

John 3 verse 23

Mark tells us that John baptises people in the river Jordan:

Mark 1 verse 5

When Jesus is baptised we are told that he went up from the water:

Matthew 3 verse 16

When an Ethiopian official is baptised, the record says that they went down into and came up out of the water:

Acts 8 verse 38 and 39
