- 1. As Samuel's sons were no better than Eli's, what did the elders ask Samuel to do?
- 2. In answer to Samuel's prayer, God said that the people had not rejected him, but who had they rejected?
- 3. After Samuel described what the king would be like, why did the people still want a king?



Summary Points

- v 1 to 9 Like Eli's sons, Samuel's are also corrupt, so the elders of Israel come to him with a request
- v 10 to 18 Samuel warns of the consequences (see theme) of having a king
- v 19 to 22 Despite his warnings, the people insist, and God tells Samuel to do what they ask

Theme

God's principles cannot be ignored without consequences

A selection of verses showing that there will be consequences if we ignore what God says.

The early Israelites are told the results of both obeying and disobeying God:

Deuteronomy 11 verses 26 to 28

Isaiah later tells the Israelites the consequences of disobeying God:

Isaiah 1 verse 20

The apostle Paul spells out the consequences of ignoring God:

Romans 1 verse 18

He points out the results of rejecting God's truth:

Romans 1 verses 24 to 32
