A Psalm of David drawing contrasts between the righteous and the wicked. The Psalm is acrostic with sets of lines all starting with consecutive letters of the Hebrew alphabet.

# Summary Points

- v 1 to 9 David gives advice on godly living. Instructions to trust, delight and commit are all followed by reassurance that God is with those (see theme) who live like this
- v 10 to 22 Those who are blessed by God are contrasted with those who are wicked
- v 23 to 29 God will look after the righteous and keep them in the land
- v 30 to 40 God will protect his people from the wicked who will be cut off

#### God is with his people

A selection of verses showing that God promises always to be with his people.

God promises to be with Abraham's son [Isaac] and his grandson [Jacob]:

Genesis 26 verse 3, 28 verse 15

God says he will be with Joshua as he was with Moses:

Joshua 1 verse 5

God says he was with David wherever he went. He has destroyed his enemies and made him great:

2 Samuel 7 verses 8 and 9

David asks that God will be with his son Solomon in building the temple:

1 Chronicles 22 verse 11

Jesus Christ promises that he and God will be with those who love him:

John 14 verse 23

Paul ends his letter to the Romans by asking that God may be with the early believers:

Romans 15 verse 33
