Summary Points

- v 1 and 2 One day Israel will be restored to their own land. Those who were oppressing them will be their servants
- v 3 to 11 Isaiah predicts the fall of Babylon (see map), a nation that isn't even a threat yet, but their king will think himself invincible
- v 12 to 23 A poetic description of the pride (see theme) and arrogance of the king of Babylon and his coming downfall
- v 24 to 32 God threatens judgements on two other enemies
