Understand your Bible reading plan





Introduction

Peter tells the early church about the conversion of Cornelius - a non-Jew (v 4). Non-Jews are then accepted into the early church.

Questions

- 1. What was the reaction of those who initially contended with Peter, when they heard his story?
- 2. In what place were the disciples first called Christians?
- 3. What was the reaction of the church in Antioch when they heard of the famine in Judea?



Summary Points

- v 1 to 18 Peter is initially criticised for preaching to Gentiles (non-Jews, see theme), but the believers glorify God when they hear the full story of the conversion of Cornelius (Acts 10)
- v 19 to 24 Oppression makes believers travel further afield to preach, mainly to Jews. Barnabas is sent to help the growing church in Antioch in Syria (see first map)
- v 25 to 30 Barnabas finds Saul to help preach in Antioch. Then a worldwide famine is prophesied and believers show compassion by sending relief to their fellow believers in Judea (see second map)

God's people include both Jews and non-Jews

A selection of verses showing that both Jews and non-Jews can be involved in God's plan.

The promise God makes to Abraham makes it clear that all nations can be involved throughhis offspring:

Genesis 12 verse 3, 22 verses 17 and 18

The apostle Paul confirms this idea to the Galatian believers:

Galatians 3 verses 7 to 9

There are also many hints in the Old Testament that God always intended that individualsalvation would be available to all:

Psalm 117 verses 1 and 2

The apostle Paul says that it is his mission to preach salvation to all:


