Understand your Bible reading plan





Introduction

Paul is brought before the Roman governor Felix (v 2).

Felix hears Paul's case, but won't make a decision. Paul remains a prisoner for two years till Felix is replaced by Festus.



Questions

- 1. How does Paul summarise to Felix what he was doing?
- 2. What was it that Paul thought the council had against him?
- 3. What did Paul reason with Felix about?



Summary Points

Note that from v 7, the verse numbers in the WEBBE version of the Bible on this site are one ahead of most other versions.

- **v 1 to 8** (1 to 9) Five days later, after arriving at Caesarea from Jerusalem (ch. 23), the Jews accuse Paul in Felix's court. They accuse him of causing trouble and profaning the temple
- v 9 to 21 (10 to 22) Paul refutes the charges, citing witnesses, claiming to be guilty only of believing what is written in the Old Testament. He mentions several first-century Christian beliefs (see theme)
- v 22 to 26 (23 to 27) Felix has further meetings with Paul, who is held in custody for 2 years. Paul disturbs Felix by talking about right living and judgement to come

Theme

First-century Christian beliefs - Acts 24 (preached to a Roman official)

Note that from v 7, the verse numbers in the WEBBE version of the Bible on the website are one ahead of most other versions.

- **v 9 to 22** In his defence to Felix, a Roman official, Paul says that he:
 - v 13 (v 14) is a follower of the Way the Christian gospel, and worships the God of the Jews and believes what is written in their prophets
 - **v 14** (*v 15*) has the same hope as the Jews, believing in the resurrection of just and unjust
 - v 15 (v 16) tries to keep a clear conscience in his relationship to God and other people
